The Oregon DECA State Officer Program provides tremendous opportunities for students to gain new leadership skills, learn critical thinking, improve their planning and organization skills, become stronger speakers, demonstrate initiative, and much more. In short, it is a unique and valuable experience that we are excited to share with your students.

Along with the considerable benefits that come with being a State Officer there are important responsibilities that officers take on and we need your help to ensure that students who plan to run for state office are aware of these responsibilities and, if elected, both you and they will ensure that those responsibilities are fulfilled.

As an advisor with a candidate and (if elected) a State Officer the expectation is that you will:

- Assist your candidate with completing all required aspects of the State Officer candidate application and review their campaign speech and campaign materials.
- Make a personal commitment to cooperate with the State Advisor and State Officer Coach to ensure that your State Officer fulfills all of their State Officer responsibilities.
- Serve as an ongoing mentor to your State Officer.
- Arrange additional time to work with your State Officer.
- Review with your State Officer the State Officer team Program of Work and Accountability Chart to ensure that they are on track and up to date on all assignments.
- Edit and review materials and communication before officers submit and distribute them.
- Provide your officer with workspace supplies, telephone access, email access and any necessary financial support.
- Assist with the ongoing training of all officers.

By signing the forms included in this packet you are making a commitment to your candidate/State Officer and Oregon DECA. Training and directing our State Officers is a team effort and it is essential that the officer's advisor is a part of that team.

Thank-you for encouraging your student to step forward and seek a State Officer position with Oregon DECA.

IS RUNNING FOR OREGON DECA STATE OFFICE RIGHT FOR ME?

We are excited that you are considering running for an Oregon DECA State Office. The opportunities provided to State Officers are tremendous and many of our State Officer alumni count their time as an officer as a pivotal experience in their life. Along with the opportunities and benefits of being an officer comes many important responsibilities. Be sure that you carefully consider your decision to run for state office and what it requires.

The average State Officer will spend five to ten hours a week working on their State Officer assignments and responsibilities. Prior to State Officer meetings, conferences and DECA events the amount of time required tends to spike as officers finalize preparations and polish up assignments. It is important to realize that although academics remain the number one priority, you will not be able to fall behind in your responsibilities as a DECA officer. You will be required to participate in the team decision making process, perform your assigned tasks, and attend all required conferences and events.

It is important to understand that if you are elected you will be required to attend conferences, officer meetings and DECA events throughout the year. You will not be allowed to leave early, come late, or miss any parts of these events (except in the case of an extreme emergency). We have frequently had officers who had to miss out on big games, dances, trips, etc. because they conflicted with their State Officer responsibilities. The expectation is that your State Officer responsibilities and commitments will take priority after your academics.

Please carefully review the documents and information in this packet to be sure that you fully understand what will be expected/required of you as a State Officer if you are elected.

If you are willing to make this kind of commitment and are the type of person that has the drive to succeed and the encouragement and dedication to get the job done, a DECA office is definitely for you! If you are unsure, you may want to speak with your advisor to see if running for a state office is right for you. If you decide to run for office, be assured that holding state office will be one of the most memorable experiences of your life and one of the most effective career preparation experiences you could ever have while in high school.

STATE OFFICER CANDIDATE DEADLINES

- January 29, 2019 All forms must be received at Oregon DECA by 5:00 p.m.
- February 24, 2019 The candidate briefing session, officer candidate exam and campaign speech presentation are mandatory activities and will be conducted at the SCDC on Sunday, February 24, 2019. The briefing session begins at 10:00 a.m. and all candidates must be in attendance. In the event a candidate's chapter is not planning to arrive at the SCDC in time for the briefing session, it is the responsibility of the candidate to arrange for transportation, in accordance with his/her school district's policy, to the conference site in time for her/him to participate in the session.
- February 26, 2019 If elected, the candidate will meet in Headquarters (Suite 206) for a 30-minute transition meeting after Grand Awards.

ELIGIBILITY

1. A candidate must be an active member in good standing of Oregon DECA and DECA Inc. by the published deadline date.
2. A candidate should have held or be holding a DECA chapter office, but it is not required.
3. A candidate must have earned a GPA of 2.50 (4.00 scale) or better for the term preceding their running for office.
4. To be eligible to run for a state office each candidate must complete the application, be in attendance at the SCDC, attend the candidate briefing session, take the officer candidate test, deliver a campaign speech, and follow all election guidelines. The chapter advisor is the only person authorized to initiate State Officer candidate proceedings. There are four phases leading to the election of an Oregon DECA State Officer of the High School Division: (I) Nomination, (II) Examination, (III) Campaigning and (IV) Election.

NOMINATION

1. It is the chapter advisor's responsibility to have the nomination forms completed by the candidate and returned to Oregon DECA by January 29, 2019. Each chapter may submit only one candidate for each available office. Offices are held individually; no co-positions.
2. The forms which must be completed and submitted **online** on or before the deadline are: (1) Oregon DECA State Officer Candidate Information; (2) Oregon DECA State Officer Candidate Q & A: a source of information for Voting Delegates to be published in the "Guide to the Candidates" booklet; and (3) Oregon DECA State Officer Uniform Information.

The forms which must be completed and submitted **via email** to registration@oregondeca.org on or before the deadline are: (4) Advisor Checklist; (5) State Officer Candidate Agreement; (6) State Officer Conduct Agreement; (7) State Officer Travel Authorization Form; (8) School Administration Statement of Support; and (9) Oregon DECA Delegate Permission/Medical Release Form.



EXAMINATION

1. A test for each candidate will be administered on Sunday of the State Career Development Conference.
2. The score received on the officer candidate exam will serve to show the candidate's knowledge of the organization and the office sought. Exam scores will be published and made available to all individuals attending the State Career Development Conference in the conference headquarters by 8:00 a.m. on the following day. Officers are strongly encouraged to obtain a score of 90% or better, however it is not required.
3. Test questions will be based on information published in the "Oregon DECA Knowledge Test Guide," which can be found online at http://oregondeca.org/officers_candidates.php.
4. An adult facilitator, appointed by the executive director, will oversee the State Officer elections process.

CAMPAIGNING

1. "Guide to the Candidates" booklets will be available to voting delegates at the State Career Development Conference. A candidate's qualifications should include: experience, scholastic aptitude, responses to published questions, speaking ability, appearance, personality, and commitment.
2. Each candidate must attend the State Officer candidate briefing session at the State Career Development Conference. Important information relative to candidacy will be reviewed. If a candidate is not in attendance, they may be disqualified.
3. Each candidate must give a prepared campaign speech at the State Career Development Conference during the opening session or campaign rally as scheduled.
4. Speeches will proceed in the following order: (1) President, (2) Vice President of Communications, (3) Vice President of Public Relations, (4) District I Vice President, (5) District II Vice President, and (6) District III Vice President.
5. All offices are allotted two (2) minutes for a campaign speech, including Presidential candidates. All speeches and/or demonstrations in support of the candidate must be included in the time allotment. **Speeches must be reviewed and approved by the advisor prior to SCDC.**



6. Campaign materials must be in good taste. Hotel policies do not allow the posting of campaign materials on hotel walls.
7. Candidates are not allowed to begin campaigning prior to the SCDC.
8. Onsite campaigning by candidates or their representatives may begin at 12:30 p.m. on Sunday during the Voting Delegate Briefing. Campaigning ends once the ballots have been turned in during the annual business meeting. Note that no campaign materials may be brought into the annual business meeting. During the annual business meeting candidates, will give a final 30-second speech to campaign for votes, but cannot distribute, carry or wear any campaign materials. Throughout their campaign, candidates are encouraged to use handout materials. Campaign tables (one table – 8’ x 30”) will be made available to each officer candidate. **A candidate’s campaign committee can begin setting up their booth at 1:00 p.m. on Sunday.** We cannot guarantee the availability of electricity for a booth.
9. Candidates and their campaign teams are responsible for making sure that no campaign materials are left in any rooms or as litter. Failure to adequately pick-up materials may jeopardize candidacy.
10. There will be NO campaigning after curfew. All officer candidates and campaign workers must be in their rooms by curfew.
11. Candidates for the position of Vice President of Communications and Vice President of Public Relations are highly encouraged to include a portfolio of their work at their campaign booth and showcase their photography/video editing/design skills. Portfolio Content Examples: Vice President of Communications may have samples of videos they edited/created, web pages created or photographs edited. Vice President of Public Relations may have examples of newspaper articles written, sample newsletters, examples of social media usage or even Klout scores.

ELECTION

1. The State Officer election is considered as new business and takes place during the annual business meeting.
2. For the annual business meeting, all voting delegates must be in professional attire, arrive promptly and be checked in at the door before the president calls the meeting to order. All voting delegates must be seated in their designated areas by the start of the meeting. Voting delegates not seated will not be allowed to cast a vote.



3. The State President will supervise the seating of delegates, in order to ensure that only voting delegates are seated in the voting delegate seating area. Each chapter is allotted two voting delegates. One individual must be present for each vote cast.
4. A current State Officer will introduce each candidate for office. Upon introduction, a candidate will approach the podium and have 30 seconds to speak to the voting delegates one last time in a final campaign. While no campaign materials may be passed out, worn or brought to the annual business meeting, the candidate will use the final 30 seconds as a verbal campaigning effort.
5. After all candidates are called, voting delegates will pick up their ballots and begin voting. During this time, candidates may not initiate contact, but may be approached by delegates. Ballots may be turned in at any point during this time, with a final call for ballots at four minutes.
6. Chapter advisors or persons acting in a chapter advisor capacity will not be allowed to participate during the election. Unless disqualified, the previous year's officer or unelected candidate may opt to apply again.
7. A secret ballot vote will be taken. Abstentions will not be counted in the total votes cast; however, "No Votes" will be counted. If any delegate submits a ballot containing votes for a district vice president candidate in a district that is not their own, their vote for any/all district vice presidents will not be counted, including the vice president from their own district.
8. A candidate must receive a simple majority of the votes cast to be declared the winner. If no candidate receives a majority of the votes cast on the first ballot, then a run-off election will be held between the two (2) candidates receiving the highest number of votes.
9. A qualified candidate who is not elected to their first choice office may be re-nominated from the floor one additional time to the office indicated on their State Officer Candidate Resume only if there are no candidates for that office. Voting delegates from another chapter must nominate them.
10. In case of a run-off election or a nomination from the floor, delegates will have two (2) minutes to caucus with their chapter members, members or delegates of other chapters, or contact candidates. Delegates will have one (1) minute to return to their seats when directed by the presiding officer.



11. If no candidate is elected for a specific office, that office may be appointed by the newly elected executive council at its first opportunity and under the advisement of the executive director and State Officer coach.
12. Newly elected State Officers will be announced and installed at the conclusion of the Grand Awards Session.
13. Newly elected State Officers will meet for 30 minutes directly following the conclusion of the Grand Awards Session.

STATE OFFICER JOB DESCRIPTIONS

ALL OFFICERS

1. Attend all State Officer meetings from start to finish.
2. Plan the Program of Work as a team for the members of Oregon DECA, and work to achieve the goals and objectives set in the Program of Work.
3. Attend all State Officer meetings, Emerging Leader Summit (ELS), Oregon Leadership Institute (OLI), and the State Career Development Conference (SCDC). Officers are strongly encouraged to attend the Western Region Leadership Conference (WRLC) or Power Trip and the International Career Development Conference (ICDC).
4. Contribute to the publication of the online newsletter.
5. Communicate with the president, team coach(es), executive director, and other appropriate parties on a regular basis.
6. Submit a monthly report about local, regional, and state DECA activities participated in.
7. Keep a binder of all activities during term in office.
8. Participate with the State Officer team in other projects as planned.

PRESIDENT

1. Coordinate the State Officer team and conduct all State Officer meetings.
2. Provide the communication link between the officer team and other state DECA leadership.
3. Lead the State Officer team in setting and meeting all goals set in the Program of Work.
4. Represent the High School Division members at all Oregon DECA Board of Trustees' meetings.

VICE PRESIDENT OF COMMUNICATIONS

1. To create all promotional videos for Oregon DECA during term in office.



2. To have personal and/or school resources that provides access to a digital camera, digital video camera, and editing software that can be taken to state and chapter events.
3. To regularly review the Oregon DECA website for updates.
4. To regularly update all Oregon DECA social media, such as Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, YouTube and blog.
5. To lead the State Officer team in utilizing the Oregon DECA Facebook page and Twitter account to promote and publicize DECA programs, events, conferences, and activities including posting updates and photos.

VICE PRESIDENT OF PUBLIC RELATIONS

1. Generate press releases for all OR DECA events and activities and promote OR DECA to the community.
2. Contact media outlets and work to secure their coverage of OR DECA conferences, programs, and activities.
3. To develop a press kit for media representatives at all OR DECA sponsored activities.
4. To distribute news about the state association to the media.
5. To promote DECA Month to all chapters and with selected media.
6. To submit articles to various publications.
7. Take photographs during the year of State Association activities.

DISTRICT VICE PRESIDENTS

1. Communicate with the state association on district and local chapter activities and act as a liaison between the state association and chapters within the district.
2. Aid local chapters in developing their Program of Work.
3. District vice presidents shall actively recruit marketing students, DECA members, and new chapters.
4. Solicit State Officer candidates from the district.
5. Promote DECA to business and industry within the district.
6. Budget and report to executive director all financial transactions.
7. Host the District Skills Competition.

ADVISOR CHECKLIST FOR MEETING WITH STATE OFFICER CANDIDATES & PARENTS/GUARDIANS

The Chapter Advisor should schedule a meeting with the State Officer Candidate and their parent/guardian and carefully review this checklist and the rest of the State Officer Candidate Packet. Once the advisor has held this meeting and reviewed the checklist it should be completed, signed and dated, and submitted to Oregon DECA along with the required forms in this packet.

✓	ITEMS TO DISCUSS AND REVIEW WITH YOUR STATE OFFICER CANDIDATE
	Have a frank conversation with the State Officer candidate to ensure that they understand the commitments required of State Officers. Be sure that they understand that at times they will have to miss out on sporting events or other personal activities in order to fulfill their State Officer responsibilities. Officers must recognize that DECA conferences and events come before other social functions, including athletics and dances.
	Ensure that State Officer candidates understand that being a State Officer is a privilege and will require their very best effort. If elected the candidate will be required to devote several hours each week to their State Officer responsibilities and will not be allowed to fall behind on State Officer duties and responsibilities.
	Talk to the candidate about their involvement in other activities like sports, clubs, work, etc. Be sure that they have fully calculated the time commitment and are prepared to make DECA a priority if they are elected.
	Set up a plan for the officer to keep the advisor regularly updated about their projects, upcoming responsibilities, and duties of office.
	Discuss and create a time management plan for when and how the officer will complete their DECA work each day. Officers should plan to spend about 30 minutes a day (sometimes more) on DECA work.
	Ensure the officer has access to internet on a daily basis either at home or through the school. Officers will need access to Gmail for official State Officer communications.
	Carefully review this packet with the candidate and be familiar with the rules and guidelines for State Officer candidates.
	Ensure that all forms from this packet have been completed.
	Be sure that the candidate understands that while being a DECA State Officer is an invaluable experience and will be a great accomplishment to highlight on their resume and college applications, that being a State Officer should be about their passion for DECA and desire to be a part of making Oregon DECA great. This is a real commitment that will require time, effort, initiative, and commitment throughout their term of office.
	Verify and approve your candidate's speech. The speech must be appropriate and can be no longer than two (2) minutes .

STATE OFFICER CANDIDATE AGREEMENT

Purpose:

Becoming an Oregon DECA State Officer requires a commitment on the part of all parties concerned. In order to make that commitment, each party must understand their responsibility to this leadership training experience. In order for a candidate to be eligible for office, all parties indicated *must* sign this agreement. State Officer candidates should understand that, if elected, attendance at all State Officer meetings and activities is mandatory and that failure to attend any of these meetings will result in their removal from office, with the exception of emergencies/unsafe traveling conditions. They should also understand that they may be removed from office if in the opinion of the Executive Director or Board of Trustees if they fail to comply with State Officer responsibilities/assignments or participate in activities/conduct which would reflect negatively on Oregon DECA or the State Officer Team.

If elected, the candidate agrees to:

1. Attend and participate in all meetings (including, but not limited to, State Officer meetings, State Officer training's, district, regional, state and International conferences) and attest that; "I fully understand the responsibilities and obligations of the position I seek and, if elected, will carry them out to the very best of my ability. I further understand that if, in the opinion of the majority of the Board of Trustees, State Officer Coach, or the Executive Director, I fail to fulfill my responsibilities and obligations of office, and/or I violate the Oregon DECA Conduct Code, I can be removed from office. Should I fail to complete the duties of my office, I will be liable to return to DECA the amount expended for my participation during my term in office."
2. Perform to the best of his/her ability the duties of the elected office.
3. Maintain a GPA of 2.5 or better based on a 4.0 scale during their term of office.
4. Participate in **ALL** activities (start to finish) scheduled by the Executive Director or State Officer Coach of the Oregon Association of DECA including, but not limited to:

Please note that while Oregon DECA pays most travel expenses, some extra expenses will be the responsibility of each State Officer.



The Parent(s) and Candidate Agree To:

1. Authorize the release of scores received for the Officer Candidate Exam to the members and advisors of DECA.
2. If elected, authorize the candidate’s cell phone number to be printed on his/her official business cards, if applicable, unless alternative arrangements are requested in writing to State Staff.
3. Grant permission to Oregon DECA and its staff/contractors, State Department of Education, and sponsors/supporters to use the above delegate’s name and likeness (including photographs, video footage, silhouettes, and audio clips) in publications, productions, promotions and on websites for informational, promotional and other related purposes without further consideration, and acknowledge the right of Oregon DECA to crop, treat, edit, or otherwise modify the photographs, video footage, silhouettes, and audio clips at their discretion.
4. Pay for certain costs associated with being a State Officer.
5. Grant permission to release the GPA and grades of the State Officer as verification of accordance with officer requirements to maintain a 2.5 GPA.

The Parent(s) and Employer(s) Agree To:

1. Permit the candidate to participate in all scheduled Oregon DECA activities, State Officer meetings, chapter visits, and other official officer duties.
2. If the student is elected, permit, and in the case of parents, authorize the student to visit Oregon schools and participate in Oregon DECA chapter activities, conferences and meetings for the purpose of conducting official DECA State Officer business.
3. Encourage the candidate to take full benefit of the leadership development experience.
4. Attend any scheduled Oregon DECA activities, conferences and meetings when they so desire.

The Advisor(s) and All School Officials Listed Below Agree To:

1. Recommend for state office only those candidates who are qualified.
2. Host meetings of the State Officers upon request of the Executive Director.
3. Ensure the candidate's attendance at all Oregon DECA activities.
4. Permit the candidate to visit Oregon schools and participate in DECA chapter activities, conferences and meetings for the purpose of conducting official DECA State Officer business.
5. Certify that the candidate has earned a GPA of 2.5 (4.0 base) or better for the term preceding the election and that officer maintains this during their term of office.
6. Read the Candidate Agreement and Participant Code of Conduct and discuss it with the student.

STATE OFFICER CONDUCT AGREEMENT

The following conduct policies apply to all State Officers and will be in effect for the full duration of their term of office. Official conference and activities begin when the officer leaves home for the event and ends when they return home, therefore this code is in effect throughout this entire period of time.

"I agree to follow the State DECA Officer Code of Conduct while I am representing the Oregon Association of DECA as a member of the State Officer Team. I will resign my office if I fail to follow this code"

I will not possess, be under the influence of, or consume any alcoholic beverages, tobacco products, or illegal substances of any kind.

I will follow the established curfew. Curfew means I am quiet and in my own room with only those assigned to be there.

These include, but are not limited to the following: consensus building, compromising, listening, respecting other people's opinions and possessions, maintaining enthusiasm and involvement, and conflict resolution through open communications.

I will wear appropriate dress at all official functions.

I will not be engaged in any inappropriate or illicit behavior. I will immediately remove myself from all situations that could compromise my professional image.

I will refrain from dating fellow state DECA officers while I am in office. I will refrain from dating anyone while at an Oregon DECA activity.

I will leave the door open when I am in a room with someone of the opposite sex.

I will not deface public property. I will be responsible for any damages caused to rooms or facilities.

I will keep the state DECA staff informed of my whereabouts and activities at all times, where the activities are an official function of my office, or while I am in their charge.

I will be prompt and prepared at all times. I will carry out my duties and responsibilities to the best of my abilities. I will always conduct myself in a professional manner as a representative of DECA.

I will attend all official conference activities, unless I receive proper approval from state staff to be absent. If I am unable to participate in all required State Officer meetings, I will resign my office. Special permission must be received from the executive director or State Officer coach to be excused from required meetings.

I will keep my local district and chapter advisor informed of all official correspondence. I will forward a copy of all official correspondence written by me to the state office.

I will follow my local school policies where they are more restrictive than the state policies and guidelines.

I am responsible for reporting any violations of these codes of conduct committed by myself or by fellow officers.

I will participate in all activities required of me at a conference, meeting, or official State Officer function.

If other situations arise that are not covered by the Code of Conduct for State DECA Officers, I will use my best judgment in the situation. Above all I will try to act in such a way that I will reflect positively on the Oregon Association of DECA.

PERMISSION/MEDICAL RELEASE FORM (5 PAGES TOTAL) ALL OREGON DECA SPONSORED ACTIVITIES 2019-2020 CODE OF CONDUCT

Attendance at any Oregon DECA sponsored conference or activity is a privilege. The following conduct policies will apply to all delegates: students, alumni, advisors, and any other authorized persons attending the activity. This form must be signed by each student and alumni (under 21) attending an OREGON DECA activity and submitted to the chapter advisor prior to the respective registration deadline. The chapter advisor must have a completed copy of the permission/medical release form for each student attending in their possession for the duration of the event, including travel to and from the event. This Form must be kept on file in the local school district after conference.

Delegates shall abide by the rules and practices of *OREGON DECA and school district policies* at all times to, during, and from the designated point of origin of the activity. Delegates shall respect and abide by the authority vested in the OREGON DECA organization. The standards outlined in this document constitute the Oregon DECA Code of Conduct.

The following shall be regarded as severe violations of the OREGON DECA Code of Conduct:

Should a conduct code violation occur for item 1 through 7 below, regardless of when exposed, the violating student(s) will be sent home and will not be eligible to attend any other state, regional, or national conference during that school year. If the violation warrants it, law enforcement may also be notified. Determination of penalties for violations will be at the discretion of the State Management Team or the Board of Directors/Trustees.

1. **Alcohol, Drugs and Tobacco:** a student shall not possess, use, transmit, be under the influence of, or show evidence of having used an alcoholic beverage, other drugs, substances or tobacco products capable of or intended, purported, or presumed to be capable of altering a student's mood, perception, behavior or judgment; other than properly used, over-the-counter pain relievers and medications prescribed by a physician for an individual student and must be on record with the advisor. Nor shall the student possess, use, sell or transmit paraphernalia associated with drugs, alcohol, or chemical substance in any form (including tobacco), at any time, or under any circumstances, on public or private properties.
2. **Curfew:** Committing serious violations of curfew regulations as outlined in item 9 below.
3. **Willful Companionship:** Being in the willful companionship of someone who violates any portion of the conduct code, or failing to report any direct knowledge (other than hearsay) of the conduct code violations.
4. **Personal Conduct:** Cheating, dishonesty, or taking unfair advantage of others; participating in social activities other than those with conference participants; conducting acts and/or possession of weapons capable of causing bodily harm or fear of life, defacing or stealing any public or private property (for which financial responsibility will rest solely with offending individuals or their chapter); breaking the law; other serious violations of personal conduct regulations.
5. **Serious Violations** of the student conduct code of the school district or school that the student represents.
6. **Private Transportation:** Driving or riding in a private automobile during a conference, unless accompanied by an authorized advisor. (Delegates are to be housed at the conference site) Occasionally a chapter advisor, under special circumstances, may allow a student to drive or ride in a private automobile to a conference. These students are required to complete a "Permission to use Private Transportation" form to the chapter advisor prior to the conference. Permission to drive/ride applies to transportation of the student named on the form and only to and



from the conference site. Once a driving/riding delegate has arrived at the conference site, he/she shall not be in a private automobile again until leaving the site at the end of the conference.

7. **Abusive Behavior and Lewd Conduct:** A student shall not engage in any lewd, indecent, sexual, or obscene act or expression or possess such materials. A student shall not engage in verbal, physical or sexual harassment, hazing, or name-calling. The use of slurs against any person on the basis of race, color, creed, national origin, ancestry, age, sex, sexual orientation, or disability is prohibited.

The following shall be other violations of the OREGON DECA Code of Conduct:

Should a conduct code violation occur for items 8-12 below, regardless of when exposed, the violating student(s) may be sent home and may not be eligible to attend any other state, regional or national conference during that school year. Determination of penalties for violations will be at the discretion of the State Management Team or the Board of Directors/Trustees or local Advisor.

8. **Conference Conduct:** Failing to wear the supplied conference ID badge and wristband (when provided) at all times from arrival at the conference until departure at the end of the conference; leaving sessions prior to their conclusion (except in the case of emergency); failing to attend all general sessions and assigned activities (including workshops, competitive events, committee meetings, etc.) for which a delegate is registered (unless engaged in a specific assignment taking place at the same time); not abiding by the rules and regulations of DECA or school/district policies from the time he/she leaves his/her home or school for any activity and the time he/she returns to the same home or school following the activity.
9. **Curfew:** Failing to be in your assigned hotel room from the curfew time designated in the conference program until 6 a.m.; causing any noise or other disturbance audible by anyone in the hallway after designated curfew time; ordering any food after the designated curfew time; causing any other unnecessary disturbance or participating in any other inappropriate activity after the designated curfew time.
10. **Dress:** Failing to abide by the dress regulations established for the conference, as outlined in the Dress Code.
11. **Personal Conduct:** Failing to report accidents, injuries or illnesses immediately to the local DECA Advisor; failing to keep adult advisors informed of activities and whereabouts at all times; failure to comply with established grievance process for disputes about competitive event results/processes (including personally confronting judges or event administrators); using tobacco products outside of local school district policies and state law; having a member of the opposite sex in a room if no adult chaperone is present and the room door is not visibly open (e.g., the door may be propped wide open); having a delegate or advisor of the opposite sex in a room without a third person present and the door visibly open.
12. **Hotel Conduct:** Failing to meet the professional standards of housing facilities; accruing incidental room charges (i.e. phone calls, room service, pay-per-view movies, etc.) without settling the account prior to check-out; throwing objects out the window or into the hallway; moving hotel furniture from rooms (e.g., onto the balcony); failing to follow hotel rules and regulations.

Individual School District Policies may supersede the code of conduct.



DRESS CODE FOR DELEGATES ATTENDING OREGON DECA SPONSORED ACTIVITIES

The following guidelines have been developed to clarify the dress code used at all DECA conferences (regardless of locations).

ACCEPTABLE CASUAL ATTIRE

(Travel to/from conferences and non-conference activities such as shopping, sightseeing, or going out for meals, denim in good taste is allowed at OR DECA conferences only, not allowed at Western Region or National DECA)

Males: Slacks, cords, knee length walking shorts, sports shirts, and DECA t-shirts and sweatshirts. NO gang related clothing or accessories allowed. All clothing must be in good repair and proper size. Undergarments may not show outside of over garments.

Females: Slacks, cords, skirts, blouses, sports shirts, knee-length walking shorts, and DECA T-shirts and sweatshirts. No gang related clothing or accessories allowed. All clothing must be in good repair and proper size Undergarments may not show outside of over garments.

ACCEPTABLE BUSINESS ATTIRE

(Opening/ Closing Sessions, workshops or banquets)

Males: Dress slacks, dress shirt, tie, dress shoes and socks, (no tennis shoes or flip-flop sandals), sweater and/or sport coats. A dress suit or DECA blazer is always appropriate. Shirts are to be tucked in. Belted pants.

Females: Dress (professional business), dress slacks, skirt (not to exceed 3 inches above knees), blazer, dress blouse or collared shirt, coordinated shirt/ blouse, city shorts, dress shoes, (professional business) (no tennis shoes or flip-flop sandals). A dress suit or a DECA blazer is always appropriate. Nylons are recommended with all professional dress.

Activities such as swimming, sunbathing, jogging, or tennis warrant appropriate recreational attire for that activity.

At any time during the conference while on-site (including hotels), you must be in casual or business attire.
